Legislators Announce Proposal to Change K12 Funding Formula

On Monday, September 26, Senator Don Schaible and a group of legislators unveiled a proposal that would alter the K12 funding formula in an effort to cut property tax.

Sen. Schaible (R-Mott) has chaired the Senate Education and interim Education Funding committees for the past few biennia. A farmer and former school board member, Schaible has a firm understanding of North Dakota's complicated education funding formula.

Under the proposal, the state would assume a larger portion of the part of property tax apportioned to K12 education funding in an effort to cover about 85% of education funding (compared to approximately 70% currently). The proposal would do so by buying down mills from the current 60 to 30 mills. The proposal would reduce the current cap on the 70-mill general fund levy authority to 30 mills (or an amount equal to) and end the practice of using mills when calculating and levying taxes in favor of easier-tounderstand dollars. Legislators also noted that the plan would freeze the education-dedicated piece of property valuations for two years.

These changes would increase the state's share by an estimated \$340 million in additional school funding for the two-year budget cycle starting in summer 2023. The current proposal



uses investment earnings from the Legacy Fund to cover the extra State share, but legislators speculated that money could come from other funds as well. The proposal does not change or limit how cities, counties, or parks collect property tax.

Sen. Schaible and Bismarck Rep. Mike Nathe expect that the proposal would reduce property taxes by about 25% statewide, addressing a key concern legislators hear from many of their constituents. Legislators do not view this proposal as a new idea, but rather, a similar approach to the one that was used when the State rewrote the K12 funding formula in 2013. The

plan has not yet been written down as a bill but will be done so by the 2023 Legislative Session in January.

NDSBA has not formerly taken a position on the proposal at this time but looks forward to reviewing the details when they become available. We are guided by Standing Resolutions that are supportive of the state's commitment to "adequately funding" K12 education (A6), supportive of direct state funding at a level to reduce reliance on local property taxes (A11) but opposed to any attempts to further limit taxing authority of the state (A14) and school districts

Any concerns will likely center around whether the additional state funding will be adequate and the difficulty districts may face in levying "new money" due to the valuation and general fund levy caps. School districts continue to compete with other political subdivisions in attracting and retaining non-certified staff. We are often unable to give raises equal to those received by city, county, or parks staff, and further limitations on school district taxing authority may widen that gap.

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Legal Spotlight AG's Opinion: Administrative Committees Not Subject to Open Meetings Requirements

This past month, the North Dakota Attorney General issued an opinion (NDAG 2022-O-13) addressing whether a committee created by school administration are governing bodies subject to the open meetings requirements. Specifically, the Attorney General was requested to issue an opinion regarding whether the Minot Public School District violated NDCC 44-04-19 by holding an unnoticed committee meeting.

The committee at issue was established by Minot Superintendent Mark Vollmer to "assist him in developing a plan to address precautions that MPS could implement to keep schools as safe as possible, which continuing the fine tradition of excellence in education following the COVID-19 closures." The committee's members included public health employees, educators from all academic levels, and parents of MPS students. No board members served

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Lucas Greff, Mott-Regent Steve Halldorson, Devils Lake Jim Rostad, Minot Nathan Berseth, Richland 44 on the committee or attended the meetings of the committee. No notices or agendas for the committee meetings were provided to the public.

In analyzing the issue, the Attorney General noted that "[e]xcept as otherwise specifically provided by law. all meetings of a public entity must be open to the public." A meeting is defined in North Dakota law as a "formal or informal gathering or a work session ... of [a] quorum of the members of the governing body of a public entity regarding public business." The definition of a "governing body" includes any group of persons, regardless of membership, acting collectively pursuant to authority delegated to that group by the governing body. The Attorney General further stated that when a governing body such as a public school board delegated authority to two or more people to perform any function, including gathering information, reporting, or recommending or taking action, on its behalf, a "committee" subject to open meetings law is formed. In turn, when a quorum of the committee members gathers to perform the delegated function, the committee is holding a "meeting" that must be noticed in compliance with NDCC 44-

In two prior opinions, the Attorney General concluded that Superintendents' Cabinets are not subject to open meetings law because they were not created by school board action and were not delegated any authority by the school board (see NDAG 98-O-02; NDAG 97-O-02). In other words, the Cabinets were not "acting collectively pursuant to authority delegated to [them] by the governing body.

In reviewing the MPS committee at issue, the Attorney General concluded:

According to the MPS Board, "[t] he purpose of the [Committee] was to provide Superintendent Vollmer and his staff with input and insight into various issues identified by the Superintendent's staff to be of

importance in MPS's plan to reopening schools as well as to provide input and insight into those issued identified by the State of North Dakota in their public entitled 'North Dakota K-12 Smart Restart—Healthy Return to Leaning' plan." The Minot Public School Board was clear in its response: "Superintendent Vollmer undertook the establishment of this Committee and the decision to prepare a Reintegration Plan as part of his administrative duties and without the involvement of the MPS Board." Because the Reintegration Committee does not meet the definition of a governing body there were no violations of N.D.C.C. § 44-04-20.

Grand Forks' Ivona Todorovic as ND Teacher of the Year for 2023

North Dakota State School Superintendent Kirsten Baesler and Governor Doug Burgum announced Monday, September 19, that Ivona Todorovic, an English Language teacher at Red River High School in Grand Forks, has been named as North Dakota's 2023 Teacher of the Year.

Todorovic has worked in the Grand Forks school district for 27 years, including the last 17 years as an English Language teacher at Red River. She teaches students who are not fluent in English. Many are learning English for the first time.

A native of Bosnia and Herzegovina, Todorovic grew up in Zenica, about 43 miles northeast of Sarajevo in southeastern Europe. When the former nation of Yugoslavia broke up into six independent republics in the early 1990s, war and ethnic conflict ensued, and Todorovic and her husband, Alex, emigrated to the United States as refugees.

The Todorovics arrived in Grand Forks in June 1995, and Ivona Todorovic began working two months later as a paraprofessional at Lake Agassiz Elementary in Grand Forks. She became Red River's English Language teacher in 2005. She holds bachelor's and master's degrees in elementary education from the University of North Dakota, and a degree in elementary education from the University of Sarajevo.

At a September ceremony at Red



River held to celebrate Todorovic's selection as a Teacher of the Year finalist, Grand Forks School Superintendent Terry Brenner called her "an example of the American dream" and said her own life experience helped her relate to her students, some of whom are refugees themselves. "In many ways, she has lived their lives," Brenner said of Todorovic. "You won't find a bigger heart or champion of students."

Baesler and Burgum made the announcement in the state Capitol's Memorial Hall, a ceremony held to celebrate Todorovic and the three other Teacher of the Year finalists: Abby DuBord, of Bismarck, a firstgrade teacher at Bismarck's Elk Ridge Elementary; Megan Margerum, of Hunter, a third-grade English/Language Arts teacher at Northern Cass Public School; and Megan Wald, of Kintyre, a Linton High School business education instructor. Todorovic will succeed Bret Dockter, a sixth-grade teacher at B.M. Hanson Elementary School in Harvey, as North Dakota Teacher of the Year. Congratulations Mrs. Todorovic, the 2023 TOY finalists, and each of their school districts!

■Legal Spotlight

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This opinion provides important clarification on the application of the open meetings requirements to committees established by school administrators in furtherance of their administrative responsibilities. While the Attorney General did not specifically analyze the membership of the committee, the Attorney General may have come to a different conclusion had the committee included board members.

It is important for school boards and administrators to be aware of the establishment of committees and the application of the open meetings requirements to board committees. 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Superintendent Evaluations

North Dakota law requires that school boards complete a formative evaluation of superintendents **ON OR BEFORE NOVEMBER 15** [NDCC § 15.1-14-03]. This evaluation must take place at an open public meeting. One purpose of the November evaluation is to highlight areas of performance in need of improvement and provide a timeline for expected improved performance. The law regarding superintendent evaluations states that if the superintendent is found to be unsatisfactory in any area, the board shall detail its findings in the report and make recommendations. This process allows opportunity for professional growth before the superintendent's formal evaluation, which must be complete **ON OR BEFORE MARCH 15**, **2023**.
