

### **The Danger of Eliminating Property Taxes** - Keep It Local Strengthens Efforts

On August 2nd, the Secretary of State confirmed the validity of signatures for the measure to eliminate property taxes in North Dakota, establishing Measure 4 on the November ballot. Keep It Local, a coalition representing diverse organizations across North Dakota, opposes the measure and is intensifying its efforts to preserve essential local services and safeguard local control against the ballot measure.

With no plan indicated for how the funds will be replaced, the vital role property taxes play in funding essential services such as schools, public safety, infrastructure, and community services is in jeopardy. "North Dakota faces a critical decision that will shape the future of our local communities," said Keep It Local chair Chad Oban. "The measure to eliminate property tax threatens our ability to fund essential services locally, tasks our state legislature with covering a funding gap of approximately \$1.3 billion per year, and jeopardizes the quality of life we cherish in our neighborhoods and towns."

While it might seem appealing to homeowners, the potential consequences for local control and public schools are significant. Property taxes provide a stable and predictable revenue stream for essential services like education, public safety, infrastructure, and libraries. By tying taxation directly to property values, local governments are empowered to make decisions based on the specific needs and priorities of their residents.

Eliminating this funding source would shift the burden of funding K-12 public education to the state level. The State would have to decide how to allocate limited resources across communities with diverse needs. This could lead to a one-size-fits-all approach that doesn't adequately address the unique challenges faced by individual communities.

Property taxes are a major source of funding for school districts, and without this reliable revenue, schools would face severe budget cuts, potentially leading to:

- *Reduced Educational Opportunities:* Cuts in funding could result in larger class sizes, fewer specialized programs, and reductions in vital school resources.
- *Teacher Layoffs:* Budget shortfalls could force school districts to lay off teachers, leading to overcrowded classrooms and a decline in the quality of education.
- *Deteriorating School Facilities:* Deferred maintenance and repairs would become more common, creating unsafe and unhealthy learning environments.
- Increased Reliance on State Funding Formulas: Eliminating local control over school funding could leave districts vulnerable to fluctuations in state support.

# LEGAL SPOTLIGHT

# North Dakota's Corrupt Practices Law and How It Impacts School Districts

North Dakota's Corrupt Practices Law, codified under NDCC chapter 16.1-10, plays a crucial role in maintaining the integrity of political processes within the state. This law is designed to prevent corruption in elections and political activities. It establishes broad implications, including its application to school districts, which are often caught in the crosshairs of political campaigns and advocacy efforts.

#### **Overview of NDCC Chapter 16.1-10**

The Corrupt Practices Law prohibits various forms of misconduct in relation to elections and political activities. This includes but is not limited to, bribery, undue influence, and the misuse of public funds for political purposes. The law aims to ensure all candidates and political entities operate on a level playing field, free from coercion and improper financial influence.

Specifically, the statute makes it unlawful for any person or organization to promise or offer anything of value to a voter in exchange for their vote or to use public funds to support or oppose

a candidate, ballot measure or political party.

#### **Application to School Districts**

School districts in North Dakota, like other governmental entities, are subject to the provisions of NDCC chapter 16.1-10. It impacts how school districts and their employees can engage in political activities, particularly during election seasons.

Under the law, school districts are prohibited from using public funds or resources to influence the outcome of an election. This includes using district facilities, funds or communications channels to support or oppose any candidate or ballot measure. For example, a school board cannot allocate district money to produce and distribute materials advocating for or against a particular candidate or policy referendum. Similarly, school employees are restricted from engaging in political campaigning during work hours or using district resources for such activities.

This legal framework ensures school districts remain on neutral grounds

during elections, where public funds are not used to sway voters. Violations of this statute can lead to significant consequences, ranging from fines and imprisonment to disgualification from holding any public office in the future. Additionally, any decisions made under corrupt circumstances can be invalidated, leading to further legal and administrative complications.

#### Conclusion

As statewide elections approach, school districts should keep in mind the importance of adhering to these regulations. Remember, while districts can provide factual information about the impacts of a proposed ballot measure, they must be careful not to cross the line into urging voters to support or reject the measure. NDSBA has a template policy regarding political activities and school districts (ABBDA), ensuring compliance with NDCC chapter 16.1-10.

### State Law Requires New Board Members to Attend Workshop

North Dakota Century Code § 15.1-09-32 requires new school board members to attend an in-service training workshop hosted by the North Dakota School Boards Association or its designee within one year of assuming office. NDSBA will host the Learning to Lead (New Member) Workshop for new school board members on October 24. Topics will include the roles and responsibilities of a school board member, board ethics, and school finance. A panel of experienced school board members will also present their experiences.
